Sarasate Zigeunerweisen Rodrigo concerto for Aranjuez De Falla El amor brujo Ravel Bolero

Ravel's most famous composition Bolero, Spanishflavoured ballet score from 1928, is paired with the 1939 *Concerto for Aranjuez*, by far Rodrigo's best-known work.

De Falla's characterful 1925 ballet *El Amor Brujo (Love, the Magician)* is paired with Sarasate's *Gypsy Airs*; featuring Hungarian folk themes, it is the most popular of his pieces, containing both dazzling technical hurdles and sensuous melodies that have captivated violinists and audiences since it was first performed in 1878.



Faure Cantique de Jean Racine Bach Cantata 82 Ich habe genug


Faure Requiem



Among the most widely performed choral works in the repertoire, the *Requiem* is generally considered the greatest achievement of its highly influential French composer.

Ich habe genug, a solo cantata for bass voice, was first performed in Leipzig in 1727 for the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is one of five cantatas written for this now little-known feast day.
